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President's Note

Happy new year to you all.

Weather-wise this year is just the opposite to last, especially in the North Island. Most of the island is in drought and some are about to be declared as such. Here in Northern Hawkes Bay, the situation is a little better -we have had 89 mls for January in two falls. Stock are coping remarkably well; we sent 16 ox to the works last week and averaged \$1400. Just as well beef prices are holding up, which cannot be said for sheep, which are roughly half of last year. Something has to be done about the sheep industry, we simply cannot continue with this 'boom and bust' situation.

Onto Hereford matters and recent NZHACouncillor nominations. There will be no council election this year in either island. Sitting councillors were all returned and retiring Councillor, Jane Allan's vacancy in the South Island remains as such. Beef Exporter Bonanza

US beef prices are 7% higher than January last year.

United States imported beef prices are at record levels and are expected to go higher during 2013, into bonanza territory for New Zealand beef exporters and producers.

High feed grain prices, the smallest US cattle herd in 50 years and limited supplies from Australia, NZ, Canada and Latin America have driven import prices sky-high.

Bull beef (95CL) is at US 223c/pound and cow beef 212c/pound, both prices slightly higher than the previous records, set in March last year.

The US prices are 7% higher than January last year but the 5c appreciation of the NZ dollar has absorbed all of that lift.

Our meat companies have exaggerated the currency effect in their current farm gate price schedules, with bull and steer at 390c-395c/kg and cow 296c/kg, 7% below this time last year.

But as all NZ exporters know, a high NZD is now a seemingly permanent factor, which would be a harder to bear without record commodity prices.

New Zealander Laurie Bryant, executive director of the Meat Import Council of America based in Virginia, said all the supply and demand factors pointed to record domestic and imported beef prices this year.

The US Department of Agriculture (USDA) will publish the cattle inventory numbers on February 1 and they are expected to show a further 2% fall.

If cow-calf producers decide to rebuild their herds the shortage of domestic beef will be exacerbated, especially in cow beef production.

Australia, NZ and Canada are the major beef exporters to the US, but Canadian supplies are declining.

The USDA has already predicted total beef imports will rise 17% this year, with most of this increase expected to come from Australia, which has a large quota.

But competition for Australian beef is keen in Asian countries, especially Japan and South Korea.

Brazil and the US itself sell large volumes of prime beef to some Asian markets. Brazil, the world's largest beef producer, cannot export to the US because of endemic foot-and-mouth disease.

US exports have recovered after the long interruption caused by BSE disease incidents, but for the first time since 2009 the USDA expects US beef imports to exceed exports.

Imports are predicted to account for more than 10% of US beef consumption this year, Bryant said.

Many other factors influence these trends, including the relative strengths of the US and Australian dollars, the prices of feed grains for beef feedlots, pig and poultry producers, and the reactions of consumers to much higher protein prices, Bryant said.

Consumption of all meat has declined steadily over the past five years in the US, with beef leading the way.

Red Meat PGP Collaboration Programme for Greater Farmer Profitability

The red meat industry has agreed to work together to promote and assist in the adoption of best practice by sheep and beef farmers, as part of a new \$65 million dollar sector development project with Government co-funding.

Wayne McNee, Director-General of the Ministry for Primary Industries (MPI), has just approved a commitment of up to \$32.4 million from MPI's Primary Growth Partnership Fund (PGP) for the red meat sector's new Collaboration for Sustainable Growth programme.

This seven-year programme will bring together a number of participants in New Zealand's red meat sector including co-operatively owned and privately owned processing companies that together account for a substantial majority of New Zealand's sheep and beef exports, two banks and Beef + Lamb New Zealand.

It aims to ensure that red meat producers consistently have access to and are able to effectively use the best-available farm and business management practices, by addressing gaps in technology transfer and ensuring stronger co-ordination between organisations and individuals working with farmers.

MPI Director General, Wayne McNee says the new PGP programme will transform the delivery of knowledge and capability within the sheep and beef sector.

"Importantly this is the most comprehensive collaboration of its type ever seen in the red meat sector, and the opportunities are very exciting. The Collaboration programme will build base capability, delivering benefits across the sector and aligned with other PGP programmes."

The next step to establish this PGP programme is to develop the contract with the Crown and to seek farmer support for their portion of the investment. It is anticipated that once the required farmer and company approvals and contracts are in place programme delivery can begin, expected to be in the third quarter of this year.

Organisations presently in this initiative are: AFFCO, Alliance Group, ANZCO Foods, ANZ Bank, Beef + Lamb New Zealand, Blue Sky Meats, Deloitte, Progressive Meats, Rabobank and Silver Fern Farms.

The programme is designed to be open, enabling others to invest. Participants will establish a formal partnership to run the Collaboration programme.

Chairman of the programme's Steering Group, Dr Scott Champion said the Collaboration programme is built on the findings of the Red Meat Sector Strategy and will deliver significantly on the Strategy's sector best-practice theme.

"This initiative is evidence that the industry is committed to delivering on the recommendations of the sector strategy. More industry collaboration is high on the list of Strategy actions, and so to have the red meat industry focused on supporting farmers and united in this programme is of major significance. Importantly, the Strategy also underlined the returns available to all farmers by lifting productivity and management towards that of the country's highest performing farms."

The PGP programme comprises several elements, including investigating how farmers prefer to receive and use new information and what drives their profitability, as well as benchmarking and integrating relevant databases. New tools, services and knowledge will be packaged and delivered in a range of ways by programme partners.

"With a new awareness of what drives farm profitability, the Collaboration programme will change the sector's focus from one that is dominated by price to one focused on performance, productivity, profitability and the factors we can control,"

Champion said.

"This investment will support the sector to better control its future and ensure confidence for continued investment."

About the Red Meat Sector Strategy

The Red Meat Sector Strategy was jointly developed by Beef + Lamb New Zealand and the Meat Industry Association, with funding support from the Government.

It was released in May 2011.

The Strategy identified a range of activities that, when implemented, will improve sector productivity and profitability, and provide greater certainty for participants.

On Reflection

....The World Hereford Council

The World Hereford Council held its 16th conference this year in Canada and since that time I have been wondering about the value of the Council and the conferences. Progress is hard to measure but at the 2012 conference every member country had the opportunity to relate their activities and all reported growth and success stories for Herefords during the previous four years.

I am now convinced that the World Hereford Council has been instrumental in moving the Hereford industry forward. Craig Huffhines from the American Hereford Association reflected on topics that he remembered in past conferences. He said that he believed that the council and its members had taken the Hereford breed through a most difficult period in the past sixteen to twenty years and had now reached a point where we could all celebrate the resurrection of the Hereford breed and be proud of its contribution to the beef industry.

The 1996 conference was held in Denver and the theme of that conference was "Quality Meat". The outcome of that conference was that more countries introduced ultra-sound scanning observations of fat depth and eye muscle area which is now a significant component of breeding objectives within a majority of our breeding programs. Most Hereford breeders will agree that the selection for carcass attributes has improved muscling and carcass yield in our breed.

The conference in Buenos Aires in the year 2000 focused on "Branded Beef." Argentina, Uruguay and New Zealand had successful programs running at that time and there was considerable interest in the advantages of such programs for the breed. There are now eight countries running branded Hereford beef programs and others have successful boxed beef enterprises within their Associations. The wonderful success of Irish Prime in the contest held by a well know food magazine in Germany and the many successes by Hereford Prime NZ Ltd in the Beef and Lamb's Steak of Origin contests has been great promotion for the breed and motivated others to brand their quality beef.

In 2004 delegates at the World Hereford Council meeting in Australia agreed to embark on a four year research program to identify some of the best genetics in the Hereford world in a Global Evaluation program. The enormous amount of data collected for this research proved to be a problem. The required capacity for computers to run multi traits has proved to be impractical however the Trans-Tasman evaluations for Australia and New Zealand and then later the Pan American evaluation for Canada, America, Argentina and Uruguay has been a major development for Breed plan users.

Genomic technology was introduced at the 2008 conference in

Copenhagen. At one time the appearance of a genetic defect would result in the culling of large numbers of the population to eradicate the problem. The advent of gene markers has greatly assisted breeders to identify carriers of a defect thus saving animals with similar blood lines which may have otherwise been culled.

The 2012 conference in Canada was a time to assess the progress and evaluate our breed. The theme of the conference was "Celebrate the new Hereford" and many country reports from member countries had positive stories to tell.

Four years ago David Prothero from the United Kingdom presented a very upbeat report on the progress in the Hereford breed and he was pleased to report a 43% increase in bull sale averages since the last conference. He attributed the breed's success to an upsurge in demand for British breeds as more emphasis had been placed on temperament, ease of calving and quality meat. His statistics had been calculated up to the end of the previous calendar year and in the last six months there had been every indication that the trend would continue.

Successive droughts in the last two to three years in the United States has reduced cow numbers quite dramatically. This coupled with record growth for exports in grain-fed beef and the growth internationally of live cattle genetics into Russia, Kazakhstan and Russian satellite states has put a great deal of demand pressure on the Hereford breed. The result has been new record prices been paid for bulls, females and feeder calves in the United States.

How successful are performance recording systems is another question which is often asked and I believe an indication of its worth can be partially attributed to the production of the end product, beef.

Once again using statistics from the United States, the cow/calf population was the lowest recorded since 1951 and yet they produced more pounds of beef last year than ever before. Breed improvement, science and modern technology has enabled the industry to keep up with the increase in demand for quality beef with diminishing numbers in our beef herds. Research is proving what most of us already knew. Herefords are efficient converters of feed to beef, they are adaptable, and real advantages can be achieved in cross breeding programs using Hereford genetics.

This year the World Hereford Council is 61 Years of age. The contacts and friendships that are made within the Hereford industry are invaluable. I think it would be fair to say the Council has achieved the purpose for which it was established and has been responsible for motivating its member countries to embrace modern technology and share innovations for the benefit of its members and the Hereford breed.
